Painting with Gouache

Gouache is an opaque watercolor paint. Transparent watercolors allow you to see the "white" of the paper below the paint, while gouache can be applied in solid colors. This allows an artist to paint in layers from dark to light.

Gouache Paints

- Opaque (not see through)
- Pigment + Chalk + Binder
- Water-soluable (can be dissolved in water)
- Fast-drying
- Matte-finish when dry (no shine)

Gouache vs Watercolors

Watercolors

- 1. Pigment + Binder
- 2. Water-soluble (easily thinned and cleaned with water)
- 3. Fast-drying
- Matte-finish when dry
- 5. Can be re-wet
- 5. Transparent (see-through, allowing light to pass through) and usually applied to white surface

Gouache vs Acrylic

Gouache

- Pigment + Chalk + Binder
- Water-soluble (easily thinned and cleaned with water)
- Fast-drying
- Matte-finish when dry
- Can be re-wet
- Opaque (not able to be seen through)
- Can mimic the quality and consistency of watercolors when thinned with lots of water

Acrylic

- Pigments + Binders (contains synthetic polymer binders)
- Water-soluble when wet (easily thinned and cleaned with water)
- Fast-drying
- Glossy, water-resistant when dry
- Can mimic the quality and consistency of watercolors when thinned with lots of water
- Texture and consistency can be modified with acrylic gels, acrylic mediums, or pastes to create various effects
